1. Purpose. To publish instructions for the I Marine Expeditionary Force Headquarters Group (I MHG) Anti-Terrorism Force Protection (ATFP) Program in accordance with the references (a) through (j).

2. Cancellation. None.

3. Situation. The threat of terrorism within the United States has grown exponentially over the last decade. I MHG will utilize all assets available to detect, deter, and defeat all threats to its personnel and assets. In accordance with the references, this order establishes policy, responsibilities, and procedures for I MHG as the Force Protection Conditions escalate. This is an I MHG order that has been coordinated with 21 Area Guard. The purpose of this order is to establish and promulgate policy, procedures, and requirements for implementing the I MHG ATFP Program. I MHG and 21 Area Guard have developed an ATFP program directing threat awareness education, access control initiative, and unit force protection posture. The goal of the I MHG and 21 Area Guard ATFP coordinated effort is to protect service members, DOD civilians, family members, contractors, facilities and equipment in all locations and situations that fall under the cognizance of the I MHG and 21 Area Guard Commanding Officers. This program is designed to increase ATFP awareness within the I MHG community and address a variety of threats that can impact readiness, morale, health, and welfare.

a. Enemy. The threat of enemy forces is assessed on an annual basis through the Installation Threat Assessment. The threat assessment is conducted by NCIS of all functional areas, interior and exterior.

b. Friendly

(1) Higher. I Marine Expeditionary Force (I MEF).

(2) Subordinates.

c. Attachments/detachments. N/A.

4. Mission. In the event of an incident, I MHG will conduct emergency operations, in coordination with 21 Area Guard; and local, county, state and federal agencies to minimize the loss of life, the disruption of Base operations, and to reconstitute Base capabilities as soon as possible.

5. Execution

a. Commander's Intent. The primary intent is the protection of personnel first then the protection of assets. We must ensure that during periods of elevated threat we do not impair our ability to function. The plan must be executable by using our resources for the initial response. We must also recognize that a major disaster, CRBNE or WMD event, will impact the entire region, not only Camp Pendleton. Therefore, our response must be tied to an executable and integrated regional response along with coordination of plans with existing MOU/MOAs executed with area units. The desired end state is a comprehensive Anti-Terrorism (AT) program that effectively: (1) saves lives and prevents human injury; (2) minimizes mission degradation by protecting unit assets.

b. Concept of Operation. The I MHG ATFP Program can only be successful if the Marines and Sailors are alert, well trained and prepared for all contingencies. It is the responsibility of all leaders to ensure that their Marines, Sailors, civilians and family members have planned, trained and prepared to survive threats as they arise for the best possible protection.

c. Tasks. I MHG personnel and assets will provide support (personnel and vehicles) in accordance with MOU/MOA to the 21 Area Anti-Terrorism Officer (ATO). Units will be tasked to support based on their operational capability and battle space function.

(1) I MHG. Appoint, in writing, a trained ATO who will manage the I MHG ATFP Program.

(2) I MHG ATO

(a) Develop and manage the I MHG ATFP Program.

(b) Attend the 21 Area AT Working Group (ATWG). The ATWG will meet at least once a quarter. The purpose of the group is to identify shortfalls, training needs and examine current technologies.

(c) Act as the I MHG Commander's principal advisor on all ATFP matters.

(d) Ensure the timely and pertinent dissemination of AT threat information and intelligence, and implement effective AT risk management processes.

(e) Ensure that the Local Area Threat brief is updated quarterly and disseminated to the I MHG MSCs.

(f) In accordance with the I MHG Mexico Travel Policy and the Combatant Commander's (COCOM) foreign travel policies, ensure personnel conducting foreign travel receive a country brief from G-2, a threat brief from the ATO, and have built and submitted an individual force protection plan (IFPP).

(3) I MHG MSC Commanders

(a) Per the references, each Battalion will appoint an ATO. This ATO will be a level II trained Marine or Sailor. A commander may appoint a non-level II trained Marine or Sailor, however, every effort will be made to ensure he is level II trained at the earliest convenience.

(b) Ensure the timely and pertinent dissemination of ATFP threat information and intelligence, and implement effective ATFP risk management processes.

(c) Ensure that the Local Area Threat is briefed to all personnel quarterly, or as required.

(d) In accordance with the I MHG Mexico Travel Policy and the COCOM's foreign travel policies, ensure personnel conducting foreign travel receive the G-2/S-2 country brief and the ATFP threat brief for that country.

(4) Unit ATO. Ensure every Marine or Sailor receives AT Level I training on an annual basis. ISOPREP registration must also be completed. Level I training will be conducted by a Level II trained instructor or individuals can complete the level I training online at <http://www.at-awareness.org>.

6. Administration and Logistics. The I MHG ATFP Program is managed by the I MHG ATO in accordance with the references. Guidance for ATFP support planning and operations is available in applicable orders and directives. Unforeseen issues involving the implementation of AT measures will be clearly documented and forwarded through command channels for resolution.

7. Command and Signal


a. Command

(1) Applicability. This order is applicable to all I MHG Subordinate commands and personnel.

(2) Existing peacetime and contingency command and control structures apply during AT planning, coordination, and operations.

b. Signal. Updates on the threat condition for the I MHG AOR will come from the Marine Corps Base Camp Pendleton Commander. Threat updates can be located on the I MEF SIPR website or NCIS SIPR website.

8. This order will remain in effect until canceled or amended.

1. Per the references, the following areas and property are vital to national security and are designated restricted areas as indicated:

a. Level III Restricted Area. Contains assets considered vital to national security, which if lost, stolen, compromised or sabotaged would cause grave damage to the command's mission or national security:

- (1) I MEF COC SCIF Bldg# 210723.
- (2) 1st RAD BN SCIF Bldg# 11040.

b. Level II Restricted Area. Contains assets considered to be of substantial importance to national security, which if lost, stolen, compromised, or sabotaged would cause serious damage to the command's mission or national security:

- (1) I MEF Armory Bldg# 21674.
- (2) I MEF Military Working Dog facility Bldg# 17015.

c. Level I Restricted Area. Contains a security interest that if lost, stolen, compromised, or sabotaged would cause damage to the command mission and national security:

- (1) I MEF Motor Pool Bldg# 214026.

d. Mission Essential Vulnerable Areas (MEVA). Areas designated by the Commander that are vital to unit safety and readiness.

- (1) Barracks Bldg# 210705.
- (2) Chow Hall Bldg# 210802.
- (3) Supply Bldg# 214021.
- (4) I MEF Medical/Dental Bldg# 210735.

ANNEX C, APPENDIX 8 - BARRIER PLAN1. Situation

a. General. The 20/21 Area barrier system is designed to serve in a supporting role to the Base's perimeter barrier system. It focuses on blocking off areas or structures that the Command designates as high-risk areas prone to an attack. The Area barrier plan will incorporate the use of water filled barriers and cement barriers. Vehicle support will be provided by AAS Bn MT to fill the water filled barriers, a forklift to move cement barriers and provide additional vehicle support as barriers to restricted areas in the 20/21 Area.

b. Graphic Overlays. Graphic depictions and photos of the Area's Barrier plan during the varying FPCON Levels are attached at the end of this Appendix.

2. Concept of Operations

a. Baseline Posture. All barriers are stored next to Bldg. 210725 for deployment. When FPCON condition changes to Bravo the barriers will be repositioned into the following locations as the Area's baseline posture. When ordered or FPCON changes the barriers will be emplaced in the following prioritized order:

(1) Barrier System #1. This system of barriers is comprised of 9 plastic water-filled barriers placed on "A" Street to create a serpentine for outbound and inbound traffic.

(a) Location. The barriers will be placed in the area of the Amtrack on A Street.

(b) Mission. The mission of Barrier System #1 in conjunction with Marines described in Post 8, is to check all vehicular traffic from being able to drive in or out of the 21 area depending on the situation.

(c) Execution. Barriers will be in place as VCP 1 (Post 8).

(2) Barrier System #2. This system of barriers is comprised of six plastic water-filled barriers placed at two locations around the MEF/MOC bldg. 210723, parking lot area and is used in conjunction with the Marines described in Post 9.

(a) Location. System two is set up with two barriers at the south entrance and four at the northern entrance to the MEF/ MOC parking area.

1. Two on Parking entrance on the South entrance to the MEF/ MOC parking area.

2. Four on parking entrance on North entrance of MEF/ MOC parking area.

(b) Mission. The mission of Barrier System #2 is to block all vehicular traffic from being able to have direct access into the MEF/ MOC area parking. The barriers in the southern entrance are used to either slow vehicles down for ID check or to completely shut off the area. This will be the only entrance to the MEF/MOC parking area. The northern entrance barrier systems will block all vehicular traffic from entering the parking area.

(c) Execution. Move six barriers from the west side of Barracks 210725 to location.

(3) Barrier System #3. This system of barriers is comprised of four sets of three plastic water-filled barriers placed side by side lengthwise. This is used in conjunction with the Marines described in Post 2.

(a) Location. System Three is located in front and the sides of building 210701, MEF CG Building parking lot.

(b) Mission. The mission of Barrier System #3 is to prevent access to the front of bldg. 210701.

(c) Execution. Emplace three barriers at each of the entrances and exits to the parking area. Emplace guard personnel at the western entrances and allow traffic to enter only through one entrance.

(4) Barrier System #4. This system of barriers is comprised of six plastic water-filled barriers. Two barriers at each entrance of North and South parking lot of the 21 Area Mess Hall. This is used in conjunction with the Marines described in Post 6.

(a) Location. System four is located at the Chow Hall on the North and South entrances to the parking lot.

(b) Mission. Barrier system #4 is to block all vehicles from the exposed sides of the Chow Hall.

(c) Execution. Move the six barriers to locations described.

(5) Barrier System #5. This system has seven barriers. This is used in conjunction with Post 3.

(a) Location. System Five is located at the 21 Area Armory parking lot.

(b) Mission. This system is to block unauthorized vehicles from the vicinity of the 21 Area Armory.

(c) Execution. The barriers will already be prepositioned in FPCON Bravo. The Barriers will be emplaced to prevent vehicles from entering thru the eastern entrance and to prevent direct access by vehicle through the Armory's gates.

(6) Barrier System #6. This system of barriers consists two sets of four barriers and will be used in conjunction with Marines described in Post D1 and D2.

(a) Location. One set will be emplaced along Ash Road and one on Wire Mountain Road.

(b) Mission: This system is to restrict and monitor access into the 20 Area Wire Mountain and housing areas.

(c) Execution. Emplace barriers on roads in a serpentine fashion to slow traffic and provide protection for guard forces. These areas can be improved over time as the situation develops. This is in conjunction with Post D-1 and D-2 instructions.


(7) Barrier System #7. This system will start with emplacement of twelve barriers to restrict access of vehicles to the commissary area. This plus the use of military vehicles will be determined by Area Commander.

(a) Location. The barriers will be emplaced on Lemon Grove Rd., and the three entrances to the Commissary parking area.


(b) Mission. To restrict and supervise access to the Commissary parking area and loading docks.

(c) Execution. Move barriers along with personnel to the entrance areas described above. Initially, vehicles should be used as well until further barriers can be put into place. Used in conjunction with Post D-3.
