General Smith is currently serving as the 36th Assistant Commandant of the Marine Corps.

Born in Kansas City, Missouri, and raised in Plano, Texas, General Smith graduated from Texas A&M University and was commissioned in 1987. He has commanded at every level, including Weapons Company, 2nd Battalion, 2nd Marine Regiment during Operation Assured Response in Monrovia, Liberia; 1st Battalion, 5th Marine Regiment during Operation Iraqi

Freedom; and 8th Marine Regiment/ Regimental Combat Team 8 during Operation Enduring Freedom. He also served in Caracas, Venezuela as part of the U.S. Military Group.

As a General Officer, he commanded U.S. Marine Corps Forces Southern Command, 1st Marine Division, III Marine Expeditionary Force, and Marine Corps Combat Development Command.

General Smith's staff assignments as a General Officer include serving as the Director of Capability Development Directorate, Combat Development and Integration; Senior Military Assistant to both the Deputy Secretary of Defense and Secretary of Defense; and Deputy Commandant for Combat Development and Integration.

Lieutenant General Smith was commissioned through the NROTC program at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in May 1985.

A career infantry officer, his assignments in the operating forces include Rifle Platoon Commander and 81mm Mortar Platoon Commander in 2d Battalion, 1st Marines; Logistics Officer and Rifle Company Commander in 1st Battalion, 3d Marines; and Commanding Officer, 1st Force Reconnaissance Company,

during which he deployed twice in support of Operation IRAQI FREEDOM (OIF).

Other assignments include Series and Company Commander, Marine Corps Recruit Depot San Diego and Aide-de-Camp to the Commanding General; Inspector-Instructor, 4th Force Reconnaissance Company; Future Operations Planner, I Marine Expeditionary Force G-3 and G-5 where he served as the MEF's lead planner for OIF I; and Deputy Operations Officer, 1st Marine Division.

From 2007 to 2010, Lieutenant General Smith served as the Commanding Officer, The Basic School in Quantico, Virginia. He then served consecutively as Military Assistant to the Assistant Commandant and Military Secretary to the 35th Commandant of the Marine Corps.

As a General Officer, he served as Commanding General, MAGTF Training Command/ Marine Corps Air Ground Combat Center, Twentynine Palms, California; Deputy Commander, Regional Command Southwest in Helmand Province, Afghanistan; Deputy Commanding General, Marine Corps Combat Development Command, Quantico, Virginia; Director, Manpower Plans and Policy Division, Quantico, Virginia; Director, Strategy, Plans and Policy Directorate, U.S. Central Command, MacDill AFB, Florida; Senior Military Assistant to the Secretary of Defense; and as the Deputy Commandant for Plans, Policies, and Operations at Headquarters, Marine Corps. He concluded his 38 years of service as the Commanding General, I Marine Expeditionary Force in Camp Pendleton, California.

Lieutenant General Smith graduated with honors from: The Basic School, the U.S. Army Infantry Officers Advanced Course where he was the Distinguished Honor Graduate for Class 2-92, Marine Corps Command and Staff College, the School of Advanced Warfighting where he was the recipient of the General Clifton B. Cates Award, and the Marine Corps War College. He is also a graduate of the Joint Forces Staff College and the Advanced Management Program at Harvard Business School. He qualified as a Military Freefall Parachutist, Jumpmaster, and Marine Combatant Diver.

He has been privileged to serve in commands that have been awarded the Presidential Unit Citation, Joint Meritorious Unit Award, Navy Unit Commendation, and the Meritorious Unit Commendation.





Major General Gering assumed the duties of Commanding General, 3D Marine Aircraft Wing on 30 July 2021. A native of Smithtown, New York, he graduated Binghamton University and was commissioned via the Platoon Leaders Class program in May 1989. Following The Basic School, he completed flight training and was designated an AV-8B Harrier Pilot.

Major General Gering's previous assignments as a General Officer include Deputy Director J3, United States Africa Command, Assitant

Deputy Commandant for Aviation, Deputy Commander U.S. Marine Corps Forces Command (MARFORCOM) and Deputy Commanding General Fleet Marine Forces Atlantic (FMFLANT).

Major General Gering's command assignments include Commanding Officer of Marine Attack Squadron 211 and Commanding Officer of Marine Aviation Weapons and Tactics Squadron 1.

Major General Gering's operating forces assignments include tours with Marine Attack Squadron 311, Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron 268 (Reinforced) 15th Marine Expeditionary Unit (Special Operations Capable), Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron 161 (Reinforced) 15th Marine Expeditionary Unit (Special Operations Capable), Marine Attack Squadron 214, III Marine Expeditionary Force Special Operations Training Group, and Joint Task Force 536. He has participated in Operations SOUTHERN WATCH, IRAQI FREEDOM I, UNIFIED ASSISTANCE, and IRAQI FREEDOM 05-07.

Major General Gering's additional assignments include AV-8B Harrier Instructor with Marine Aviation Weapons and Tactics Squadron 1, Aviation Lieutenant Colonel's Monitor and Aviation Assignments Section Head with HQMC Manpower and Reserve Affairs, Global Force Management Plans Officer with the Office of the Secretary of Defense (Personnel and Readiness) and Marine Military Assistant to the Secretary of the Navy.



Origin of the

I Marine Expeditionary Force

The Marine Corp's largest warfighting Marine Air-Ground Task Force, I Marine Expeditionary Force (I MEF), stands ready to face the emerging security challenges of today across the full range of military operations. The key to I MEF's success throughout its history has been its ability to seamlessly integrate all aspects of warfighting into an expeditionary combined arms approach. That construct, along with the initiative, determination, and talent of individual Marines, has made I MEF the nation's premier warfighting formation.

The origins of I MEF can be traced back to 1969 when it was first activated in Okinawa, Japan, under Fleet Marine Forces Pacific. A year later, it was redesignated as I Marine Amphibious Force (I MAF) and relocated to Camp Pendleton, California, where it has maintained its presence for the last 53 years.

During the Vietnam War, I MAF played a crucial role

in various operations, including supporting the Republic of Vietnam's government and assisting in counter-insurgency efforts. The force's extensive experience and adaptability in the complex and challenging environment of Vietnam solidified its reputation as a battle-tested and reliable combat force.

I MAF was redesignated back to I MEF in 1988 and quickly cemented its legacy as a premier expeditionary Marine Air-Ground Task Force. It participated in Operation Desert Shield to deter further aggression by Iraq and promote regional stability. Iraq's refusal to withdraw forces from Kuwait triggered Operation Desert Storm, where I



MEF's employment of combined airground combined operations and combat prowess were vital in the success of the coalition's swift and decisive victory, leading to the liberation of Kuwait and the expulsion of Iraqi forces from the region.

In 1992, I MEF was designated the Headquarters of Joint Task Force Somalia and tasked with restoring stability and providing relief to the famine-stricken



nation. I MEF deployed with its Major Subordinate Commands, 1st Marine Division, 3D Marine Aircraft Wing, as well as with elements of the 15th Marine Expeditionary Unit (MEU) to Mogadishu in Operation Restore Hope. During their operations, I MEF Marines conducted security operations, humanitarian aid distribution, and collaborated with United Nations peacekeeping forces to protect and aid civilians affected by the conflict and famine.

In the 2000s, I MEF played a crucial role in both Operation Enduring Freedom and Operation Iraqi Freedom, contributing significantly to the success of the United States' military engagements in Afghanistan and Iraq. During Operation Enduring Freedom, I MEF units executed a range of missions, including combat operations, humanitarian assistance, and stabilization efforts proving the flexibility of the MAGTF construct across



the full range of military operations. They conducted counterinsurgency operations and partnered with Afghan security forces to disrupt terrorist networks.

Similarly, during Operation Iraqi Freedom, I MEF units conducted major combat operations, leading the effort to seize control of key cities like Baghdad, and subsequently focused on stabilizing and rebuilding Iraq. Their involvement demonstrated exceptional combat capabilities, adaptability, and commitment to fulfilling mission objectives, solidifying I MEF's reputation as masters of expeditionary combined arms warfare.

As the security challenges of the 21st century have evolved, the argument for the MAGTF has only been strengthened based on its flexibility, scalability, and adaptability. Through humanitarian assistance to competition with peer competitors, the combat power, logistical sustainment, and an aviation capability package of the MAGTF remain invaluable to combatant commanders in every region of the globe.



As I MEF has adapted to a shifting character of war, the synergy and fabric of MAGTF remain the basis for achieving success in an all-domain, combined arms approach.

In an ever-changing world, the adaptability, resilience, and warrior spirit of I MEF Marines has proven timeless. The current generation of I MEF Marines carries that legacy forward and stands ready to defend America's interests, respond to emergencies, and contribute to global security whenever and wherever called upon.
